Jeff Crew, a skillful model railroader who loved to repair and build old Mantua and Bowser steam engines, died October 10th at the age of 90. Jeff had suffered a series of strokes in recent years and was no longer active in BBMRA. He was a charter member of the BBMRA and was one of the main "techs" to keep club and member engines going. The club has an early diesel which Jeff built from a Bowser kit.

Jeff had a layout in a room in his garage. It included the first lift-up bridge I ever saw. It was very sophisticated for operations.

Jeff was a pilot in the Army Air Corp and later the U.S. Air Force. He built plastic models of every plane he ever flew. It was quite a collection.

Dave Kerns, Roy Mantooth and Vernon Parramore were especially close to Jeff. In addition to sharing model railroading as a hobby, they all attended Trinity United Methodist Church.

Jeff was a talented modeler, wonderful person and good friend. I have several engines he either built or repaired and cherish them.

Collecting May Boost RR Hobby Interest by Larry Benson

As many of you know, my current N Scale layout is all but finished. I say "all but" because I still have a few buildings to illuminate. However, along the way I began to realize my interest in the railroad hobby was beginning slowly to shrink. Rather than letting that happen, I looked around for other ways to boost my interest and enthusiasm.

Searching for and collecting railroad items did the trick. For example, some things that have caught my attention include RR lanterns, long-spout oil cans once used to lubricate steam engines, certain Coca-Cola bottles, several static locomotives, a Marx O Gauge consist and a Russian wind-up train. Also among my meager collection are a small "electric train", two table lamps with locomotive bases one of which is Lionel with an HO steam engine that runs and whistles when it's switched on. I have already written about one or two of these collectibles in The Lantern and several forthcoming articles about others are currently in draft form.



After 72 years this Hornby clockwork locomotive still runs "like a clock".

My most recent addition is an early Hornby train set from the 1930s which I first spotted two or three years ago in a shop in Thomasville. At that time I couldn't believe my eyes! Not only was the price ridiculous but also it was way beyond what I was willing to pay. I made a counter offer but the owner of the shop refused to accept it. Not long ago Shirley and I stopped in the same store where I made a bee-line to the display case to see if the Hornby was still there.

It was sitting on a shelf peeking out from behind a display cabinet's glass door. What's more, the price was slashed almost in half – down to nearly the same as my prior offer. Really? To make sure it was true, I summoned the manager to ask if she could open the cabinet and let me take a closer look at the price tag.

Smelling a possible sale, she obliged immediately. Smelling possibly a better deal, I asked if that was her "very best" price. Without hesitating, she took another 20% off which was exactly the same as my previous offer. I tried not to laugh out loud and resisted the temptation to jump up and click my heels (as if I could).

The train set came in the box with a yellow label on one edge saying "Clockwork Hornby Trains - Gauge O M1- Goods Set Made In England By Meccano Ltd., Liverpool". Also included were the winding key, eight sections of O gauge track, six circular and two straight, and clips to secure the track together at the joints. The locomotive is red and black with forward-reverse and start-stop levers in the cab. A matching red and black wood/coal tender imprinted with the numbers "3435" in a rectangle in gold couples behind the locomotive. Two green open-top gondolas with large gold letters "L M S" and small numbers "12530" printed on each side complete the set. The letters stand for "London- Midland- Scottish" railway which was one of the Big 4 railroad companies in the United Kingdom (UK) from 1923 to 1948. Some other vintage Hornby trains I've seen carry these same markings.

Hornby is the leading brand of model trains manufactured in the UK. Their factory which is located in Liverpool is still in business. The company dates back to 1901 when Frank Hornby obtained a patent for his Meccano trains. The first Hornby "O" scale clockwork trains were produced starting in 1920 and came off the line until 1938 when Hornby sold out to the French company Tri-Ang. They manufactured trains branded "Hornby/Tri-Ang" until the 1980s when Tri-Ang entered into receivership. At that point Hornby again became an independent entity.

Although I haven't yet found an exact date of manufacture, the fact that it's "clockwork powered" suggests it must have been produced sometime prior to 1938 when Hornby quit making spring-wound locomotives solely under their brand name. By my calculations that's 72 years ago and the engine still runs "like a clock"!
